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1. a) News from the EEC – European URI-conference will take place in Brussels, Belgium, September 22-24, 2005

We herewith most cordially invite you to our URI Europe Assembly, which will take place September 22-24, 2005, in Brussels!

Following some further information on the conference - a more detailed invitation with a reply-slip will follow soon.

SUBJECT / TITLE: Overcoming irritations and prejudices between people of different cultures, religions and convictions in the EU enlargement-process

CONFERENCE-VENUE: Franciscan conference-centre "Maison ND du Chant d'Oiseau", Avenue des Franciscains, 3 A, 1150 Bruxelles, Belgium.

CONFERENCE-DATE: September 22-24, 2005 (beginning Thursday early afternoon, ending Saturday late afternoon).

Participants will be able to stay at the conference-venue for an additional night (Saturday - Sunday), but have to carry the additional cost (approx. EUR 30,-).

CONFERENCE-COST: Conference-fee, including accommodation, lodging and coffee-breaks, is EUR 120,- per person. We have worked hard to be able to offer this good rate.

(We currently foresee that URI Europe will be able to give partial scholarships to a limited number of individuals who would otherwise be unable to attend the conference. Preference will be given to participants from new European member-states or -candidate-states and from Eastern Europe as well as participants from minorities. We encourage all participants to choose the most economic means of transport (train, APX-flights) and compare prices.)

CONFERENCE-SETTING: We expect 60 people from existing URI-Co-operation-Circles (CCs = member-groups) as well as a number of people who are new to the URI. Places are limited. We will work to make sure that there is a good balance among participants regarding religions, age, gender, countries of residence.

Accommodation will be in double rooms.

As usual the focus will be on inter-action and exchange between conference-participants, many of whom have extensive experience in interfaith-encounters and act as multipliers in their respective networks.

Participants will be invited to bring sacred items and share sacred parts of the programme.

AIMS OF THE CONFERENCE:

- Overcome (at least reduce) tensions, irritations and prejudices between European citizens of different convictions and religions and foster understanding and respect.
- Interaction and exchange of experiences between participants.
- Create tools and collect best-practices for overcoming irritations and prejudices. (Materials will be later disseminated among the wider URI network.)
- Deepen interest in the European Union and its processes, by organizing 1.) a visit to the European Parliament and 2.) a meeting with an expert of the European Commission or the European Parliament.
- Strengthen and expand the URI Europe network and enhance the quality and quantity of its contributions to our over-all European societies.

CONFERENCE-PROGRAMME: The programme will include work-sessions in different formats (plenary, group-work, individual work) as well as a visit at the European Parliament and a meeting with an expert of the European Union.

APPLICATION-MATERIALS: Application-Materials will be sent out by email over this list, soon. Please mark your calendar already now.

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2. European URI CC-activities – invitations, introductions, reports

2. a) Report of the meeting of the URI Berlin CC on 19th February 2005 in a Hindu temple in Berlin-Kreuzberg

On February 19th 2005 we were warmly welcomed by the Sri Lankan Tamil Hindu Community in Berlin.

We were invited to participate in a *puja*. A *puja* is a ritualistic worship of deities of the Hindu pantheon. The *puja* consists of the recitation of Vedic hymns in the Sanskrit language in a rhythmical manner and the worship of idols of the gods with flowers, fire water etc.

After the *puja* the Brahmin priest shared *prasad* (blessed food especially water). We were all given the characteristic ashes and the red dot between the two eyebrows. After that we were invited to watch the idols of the deities more closely and members of the community explained to us their meaning and told us mythical stories of different goddesses and gods.

Very often Hinduism is reduced by outsiders to mere idol worship and stigmatised as pantheism. The idol and the gods or goddess it represents is for the spiritual seeker a vehicle to attain a higher all pervading ultimate god. Therefore Hinduism is not pantheism but panentheism.

Five URI adults and five URI children took part in this colourful flowery event. The children liked it and had contact with the children of the Tamil community. The Tamil children helped to present and explain their religion.

After that we went into an Indian restaurant with Johanna, a German member of the community. She was very interested in the URI work and while sharing a wonderful meal we made plans for the future with monthly meetings, interreligious prayers and contemplation and many other exciting projects.

All together we had a wonderful meeting and we are looking forward to our next meeting in the Sikh *gurudwara* of Berlin.

INTERRELIGIOUS PEACE CELEBRATION 050505

The 5th of May is the 60th and last great commemoration day of the liberation from World War II in the Netherlands and Indonesia.

There are still eyewitnesses, but their number is shrinking. It is our duty towards them and towards next generations to promote enduring peace and justice for all living beings without discrimination.

URI Netherlands took the initiative for an interreligious universal Peace Celebration in The Hague, city of the Dutch Government and the UN-Peace Palace:

Lange Voorhout 4, in the centre of The Hague.**

Theme of this 050505-Celebration is:

'HEALING THE PAST, SHARING THE FUTURE'

(Het Verleden helen, de Toekomst delen)

Foundation Roos took the initiative for a Peace-Walk during the 5 days preceding the 050505-Celebration.

This Peace-Walk starts at the International Monument for the Unknown Child in National Park 'Hoge Veluwe' near Arnhem. The 4th of May Princess Irene van Lippe-Biesterfeld is in charge of a Peace-Meditation.

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2. c) European URI-efforts – Sharing news of URI activities in Finland

Dear friends,

I wanted to share some of the things that take place here in the North.

We have had a good spring in Finland in the field of interfaith.

In February there was an interfaith gathering for the weekend and it was a success. Everyone was pleased about the weekend which was one of its kind in our church life in Finland. (There was an article written about it in the magazine for the Lutheran theologians.)

The participants and some rumours about other religions and convictions were solved. There were Jewish, Lutherans, Catholic, Muslims, Buddhists, people from Christian Science, Baha'is, Unitarian and agnostics, all together 21 people. There were some people who had never talked with Muslims before in their life, but most of the participants were the members of the Bridge-group and the new URI CC, that has been build in Helsinki. (The Religions Forum in Helsinki, HUF is not officially registered as a co-operation circle yet, but the application has been handed in short time ago.)

As a part of the programme we watched the film Mystic Iran, giving insights on the spiritual life of women and men of different faiths in Iran. It gave us lots of things to talk about.

We decided to continue the co-operation and to have such weekend event once a year. This event was sponsored by the Lutheran parish and it was organized by the Bridge-group which holds meetings with participants from different churches and religions. The head priest of the parish visited us and gave his warm greetings. We gave him the peace card which we had built during the weekend. One of

the most beautiful things was that we sang interfaith songs from the URI songbook, and it really touched peoples' heart and mind. (Some people kept singing and drumming till 2 AM.)



In April the Social Forum in Finland was held, and this new coming CC participated of that event by organizing a panel discussion about the Global Ethics. There were a Muslim, a Lutheran, a person form Christian Science, a Bahá'i and a Unitarian in the panel and the audience was also multi-religious.

HUF also had its own stand where the peace card was build by the method of cutting pictures out form the magazines.

There are some more events to look for:

The Bidge-group will organize an happening on the European day with URI's Christian-Muslim - dialogue group in Helsinki and the Forum of Religions in Helsinki under the title "On the Way Towards a Common United Europe". The Event will include some speeches by the head of the Finnish Church Foreign Aid Agency, Finn Church Aid, Mr. Antti Pentikäinen, Theologian of the Church Centre of the Missions, Docent Timo Vasko and the Peace Promoter Helena Kekkonen followed by a common discussion. Members of URI CCs will give their point of views and comments.

There will be barbeque and other refreshments prepared by all the participants together and the people are called to sing songs by the URI interfaith songbook. There will also be Peace Pole and the ending of the event will take place around the Pole.

The Forum of Religions in Helsinki will also take a part of the World Village Festival in May with the stand. That event is run by Kepa, the Service Centre for Development co operation in Finland.

The CCs in Helsinki have also been asked to join the Peace Forum in Loviisa to organize some event there.

In May URI's Christian- Muslim-dialogue group will organize an open walking "tour" to some religious places such as church and mosque. At this time the people might visit synagogue as well.

The URI CC in Turku, The Forum of Religions in Turku, TUF has also met several times during this spring. All these groups tend to have meetings once a month. TUF will hold an open panel discussion seminar next fall in the Folk Collage in Turku.

So, wonderful things are happening here.

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
2. e) European URI CC-efforts - Report about the Jewish Christian Muslim House of Learning; November 19-21, 2004, Arnoldshain, co-organized by the German Muslim-League Bonn CC, Germany

Frankfurt, Germany. Jews, Christians and Muslim meet in Arnoldshain to discuss gender-relations.

On November 19-21, 2004 approximately 100 people from the Jewish, Christian and Muslim faith traditions met in the Protestant Academy of Arnoldshain near Frankfurt for discussions on "Women, Men and the Patriarchy of God". This was the third conference of the Jewish-Christian-Muslim House of Learning, sponsored by the Evangelical Academy Arnoldshain, the Rabanus-Maurus-Academy Frankfurt, CIBEDO and the German Muslim-League Bonn CC. The organizers consider it as important that this has been an annual event over the last three years, as it allows for deepening of relationships and a more in-depth exchange and understanding.

The conference began with conversations in pairs. Then the pairs formed into groups of six, where introductions were made by his or her conversation-partner and the group-introductions showed the rich diversity of participants. The rhythm of the week-end was determined by the prayer-times of the three faith-traditions. In these services and prayers - Muslim Friday-prayer, Sabbath meditation, Sufi-dhikr and Christian service, the celebrants included the subject of gender relations.

The children, ages 2-15, participated in a very moving program, which was beautifully led by the husband of one of the conference-team-members. During the course of the weekend the children built their own synagogue, church and mosque (each in one corner of the room) with models of specific items of these prayer-houses also displayed. The children hosted guided tours through their exhibition.



At the end of this rich week-end participants expressed their enthusiasm for the event and the hope that the Jewish-Christian-Muslim House of Learning would convene it again in 2005. Although difficult to guarantee, given the climate of confrontation and budget-shortages in all sectors of society, we pray that this bud will continue to blossom and are proud of the ongoing commitment of so many peace-lovers.

Note: The next Jewish Christian Muslim House of Learning will take place June 16-19, 2005, on the subject of "Power, Authority, and Responsibility"

Here are some reflections of the new GC's diversity:

- 8 trustees from the current GC and 16 new trustees;
- 11 women and 13 men;
- 17 countries;
- 9 Christians, 4 Muslims, 3 Jews, 3 Indigenous, 2 Buddhist, 2 Baha'i, 1 Hindu, 1 Sikh, 1 Interfaith (with diversity within traditions).

A few words about the vote-counting process: After an opening prayer to invite the presence of the URI community around the world, the votes from 174 CCs around the world were counted at the URI office in San Francisco, 8 – 10 AM local time, Wednesday, 6 April 2005. Each region easily met the requirement that 50% of the eligible voting members participate. Latin America had the highest percentage participation – 100% of eligible CCs (17 of 17) participated. Asia had the greatest number of participating CCs – 64 CCs voted in Asia.

The ballots were read by Global Council Chair, Rita Semel and Executive Director, Charles Gibbs, alternating region by region, and supported by Sally Mahé and Victoria Smiser. Ray Signer and Barbara Hartford separately recorded the votes as they were announced, and their vote tabulations were compared for accuracy after each region's votes had been read. Iftekhar Hai, Paul Chaffee and Alice Kawahatsu observed all or part of the voting. The three nominees with the highest vote totals in each region were designated as Trustees-elect.

Once the results from a region were confirmed, all those present offered the following prayer, which all of you are encouraged to offer on behalf of all the newly elected trustees and the rest of the URI community:

May these trustees receive blessing and support to fulfill the vision and values of the Preamble, Purpose and Principles of URI. We hold in gratitude all candidates who stood for leadership, and all CCs who voted, and all who collectively serve the URI. May they serve URI with strength, love and joy.

CURRENT MEMBERSHIP: 12

TRADITIONS: Muslim, Roman Catholic, Seventh Day Adventist, Baptist

GOVERNANCE: Through the process of consultation that reflects our desire for community empowerment and participation.

CC PURPOSE: To promote Unity, Trust and Confidence among Muslims and Christians. To promote Peace and Solidarity in the community

CC DREAM: To bring peace, justice, and healing to the people in Mindanao, the southern region of the country where violence and war is raging between rebels and government troops, and affecting the wellbeing of the Muslim-Christian populace.

CC HIGHLIGHTS:

* Interfaith dialogues among Muslim and Christian leaders conducted last April 21, 29 and May 8, 2004. -

These dialogues cum workshops reaffirmed the "ties that bind" the Christians and Muslims in Kauswagan, Lanao Del Norte in Mindanao. This activity paved the way for the creation of the ad hoc Municipal Inter-Faith Council (MIFC) composed of an equal number of Muslim and Christian representatives (12 each).

* Inauguration of the Peace Center Building of the former combatants and victims of the Mindanao war in Kauswagan, Lanao del Norte -This modest structure now serves as the venue for on-site trainings and baranggay (small community) assemblies. This is where the members of the community gathered to formulate and adopt their first peace and development plan. The Peace Center Building was the site of PAKIGDAIT-initiated organizational capacity-building and livelihood trainings with the support of the Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO)-TOSCADAR Mindanao and the Catholic Agency for Overseas Development (CAFOD).

* Maranao Language Class-This language class implemented by PAKIGDAIT uses both formal and non-formal education approaches. LONDON -- The UK's Sunday Times and Sun newspapers have agreed to pay Yusuf Islam (formerly known as the singer Cat Stevens) substantial damages in respect of articles published on 17th and 19th October 2004.

Both reports falsely alleged that Yusuf Islam was or had been involved in supporting terrorism and suggested that, as a result, the US authorities had been right to refuse Mr Islam entry into the United States in September 2004.

As well as agreeing to pay substantial damages in relation to these false and highly defamatory allegations, both newspapers also published prominent apologies in which they acknowledged that Mr Islam is not, and never has been, involved in or supported terrorism, and that he abhors all such activities. Indeed, in apologising to Mr Islam both newspapers also pointed out that Mr Islam was recently presented with the "Man for Peace" award by a group of Nobel Peace Laureates. The newspapers have undertaken not to repeat these false allegations and also agreed to pay Mr Islam's legal costs.

Mr Islam said: "It seems to be the easiest thing in the world these days to make scurrilous accusations against Muslims, and in my case it directly impacts on my relief work and damages my reputation as an artist. The harm done is often difficult to repair. However, I am delighted by the settlement, which helps vindicate my character and good name."

Yusuf Islam intends to contribute the damages from both newspapers to relief projects for orphans which he has started in tsunami-hit South East Asia. He visited Indonesia in January and is set to release a charity single entitled Indian Ocean later this month, the proceeds of which will go to the same children's fund...

THE UNITY THAT UNDERLIES ALL RELIGIONS

"All religions are one. They teach a divine life. I respect saints and prophets of all religions. I respect all religions, all cults, all faiths and all creeds. I serve all, love all, mix with all and see the Lord in all".

- Swami Sivananda

At the present moment all religions contain a mixture of truth, which is divine, and error which is human. The fundamentals or essentials of all religions are the same. There is difference only in the non-essentials. The apparent differences in religions are due to a misconception or misconstruction of the long-forgotten truth of the Vedas on which they are ultimately founded. All systems of religion are equally divine and true. The conflicting points are all due to misconception and misconstruction of truths on account of prejudice, bigotry, lack of purity of heart and subtlety and purity of intellect, and perverted condition of the intellect of people.

The great majority of religions had their origin in prehistoric times. Hence there are no genuine documents or trustworthy traditions concerning them.

All prophets are messengers of God. They are great Yogins and realized souls, who have had divine, intuitive perception of God. Their words are infallible and sacred. The Koran or the Zend-Avesta or the Bible is as much a sacred book as the Bhagavad-Gita. All contain the essence of divine wisdom. Ahuramazda, Isvara, Allah, Jehovah are different names for one God.

Truth is neither Hindu nor Muslim, nor Buddhist nor Christian! Truth is one, homogeneous, eternal substance. The follower of the religion of Truth walks on the path of light, peace, wisdom, power and bliss.

Man forgets all about his religion on account of ignorance, or lust for power and greed. He has become irreligious. So he has come down to the level of a brute. He has lost all sense of morality. He does havoc. He creates mischief. He stabs, loots, and burns houses. The law of the jungle prevails.

Many preach Buddhism, but no one gives up desires and Himsa (as opposed to Ahimsa). Many preach Christianity, but no one practices love and forgiveness. Many preach Islam, but no one recognizes the brotherhood of man. Many preach Hinduism, but no one realizes the Divinity in all. Preaching has become the livelihood of men, while practice has become their object of scorn.

Hence the world is wicked, not for want of truth, nor on account of religions; but, alas, it is wicked for the lack of true followers of these ideals and religions.

What is needed is proper education of the followers of all religions. Place the practical tenets of their own religion before the followers of that religion, and devise ways and means of enabling them to express these tenets in their daily life. Without practice, idealism creates fatalism in man. Unless knowledge alters one's life, it is useless.

Selflessness and love are not creeds to be taught, but ideals to be exemplified, demonstrated and radiated. Therefore, let everyone practice his own religion and strive to attain the goal. Let religion create saints and Yogins, rather than Mandirs (Hindu temple), Masjids (Mosque) and Churches.
